Statement of intent:

At St Francis Catholic Primary School we target the use of Pupil Premium Grant funding to ensure that our disadvantaged pupils receive the highest quality of education to enable them to become active, socially responsible citizens of the future. We recognise that disadvantaged children can face a wide range of barriers which may impact on their learning.

We strive to overcome these challenges and strongly suggests that the most effective way to improve outcomes for disadvantaged children is through excellent classroom teaching. All children need opportunities to enrich their lives through experience and schools must make sure that where children are unable to access these through home, the opportunities are provided for them by the school.

LONG-TERM PLAN (3-YEAR TIMESCALE):

- 1) To ensure children are provided with quality first teaching resulting in narrowing the gap in Reading, Writing and Maths for both attainment and progress. Where appropriate high-quality interventions will be used to narrow gaps further.
- 2) Increased participation in clubs and enrichment opportunities.
- 3) Improved attendance in line with national attendance figures
- 4) Improved well-being and engagement for pupil premium children
